Margaret Thornton is one of those unusual people who has the gift of anticipating a need. If she hears someone is going for medical tests, she contacts the person to make sure he/she is not going alone. One friend said, "When I was considering knee surgery and recuperating in a nursing home, Margaret volunteered to stay with me at home. She told me I would do much better at home, and she would take good care of me."

Margaret can sense if someone is discouraged particularly because of the Covid

isolation. She will call and say, "Let's go out and get a hamburger. I'll be by in a few minutes." or is such a pretty day. "This Let's take drive."

If there is a death or illness in a family, Margaret is one of the first to come by with one of her signature dishes. She also is mindful to contact the church office and friends about anyone who may need a phone call or a visit. At any church gathering, she makes sure to include others in the group.

Margaret relates to and understands young people. If a young person needs help to enroll in college, Margaret

volunteers her services. She also has helped several young people obtain their drivers' licenses by taking them to an empty parking lot and letting them practice. One youth said, "Margaret encouraged me to attend church with her and went out of her way to make me feel comfortable. Now I have many church friends and have become involved in the youth program."

Margaret has worked unceasingly with a refugee family. She encouraged three family members to apply for citizenship, which is a long and detailed progress. She worked with them to obtain the necessary documents, helped them study for the required civic and history test, and then went with them to Charlotte to meet requirements. She always is available to accompany them to doctors' appointments and help with translation to assure they understand the doctor's instructions.

Her greatest passion for church activities is United Methodist Women, where she is involved at the local, district, and conference levels. She had the vision if the UMW is to grow, start with young girls and so she organized a multigenerational circle. The youth can learn about UMW at an early age, and older women can serve as their mentors.

Each year, Margaret hosts a Thanksgiving dinner at her house for a circle. She also invites Newport UMW to her house for a yearly luncheon.

Being the second oldest of five girls, Margaret grew up on a farm in Bowman Town community of Washington County. Her father, Tom Lewis was a (Continued on page 2)



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farmer, and since there were no boys, the girls had to help with the farm chores. In addition, they learned from their mother, Louisa, how to cook and to become gracious hostesses.

Growing up, Margaret attended Pleasant Grove UMC, a small Washington County church, where she was very active in the local and district youth programs.


Margaret enrolled at Hiwassee to study to be a youth director and received her degree from Tennessee Wesleyan College. Her first position following graduation was youth director at Newport First United Methodist Church, where she met her future husband, Jones Thornton. After serving several years as youth director, she returned to school and earned her Master's Degree in Education from ETSU. She retired from Parrottsville Elementary School after thirty plus years of teaching.

Sadness came in 2004 when her husband died at an early age, and Margaret decided to move to Morristown. Margaret's mother, who already had moved to Morristown, died two months before Jones, and Margaret decided to buy her mother's house. After her move, she became active at Morristown First as well as maintaining ties with Newport First.

Margaret is a Master Gardener and can be seen in downtown Morristown as well as the Senior Center tending flowers. She has traveled extensively through Europe as well as to Alaska and Hawaii.

Two of her sisters, Julie Compton and Virginia Street, live in Morristown and, like Margaret, are active FUMC members.

She is a humble person going about serving her Lord in a quiet manner doing what she can to help people along the way. FUMC is blessed to have such a dedicated member.
